GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The ADP151-EP is an ultralow noise, low dropout linear regulator that operates from 2.2 V to 5.5 V and provides up to 200 mA of output current. The low 150 mV dropout voltage at 200 mA load improves efficiency and allows operation over a wide input voltage range.

Using an innovative circuit topology, the ADP151-EP achieves ultralow noise performance without the necessity of a bypass capacitor, making it ideal for noise-sensitive analog and RF applications. The ADP151-EP also achieves ultralow noise performance without compromising PSRR or transient line and load performance. The low 265 μA of quiescent current at 200 mA load makes the ADP151-EP suitable for battery-operated portable equipment.

The ADP151-EP also includes an internal pull-down resistor on the EN input.




Figure 1. TSOT ADP151-EP with Fixed Output Voltage, 3.3 V

The ADP151-EP is specifically designed for stable operation with tiny 1 μ F, $\pm 30\%$ ceramic input and output capacitors to meet the requirements of high performance, space constrained applications.

The ADP151-EP is capable of 16 fixed output voltage options, ranging from 1.1 V to 3.3 V.

Short-circuit and thermal overload protection circuits prevent damage in adverse conditions. The ADP151-EP is available in a tiny 5-lead TSOT package.

THERMAL DATA

Absolute maximum ratings apply individually only, not in combination. The ADP151-EP can be damaged when the junction temperature limits are exceeded. Monitoring ambient temperature does not guarantee that $T_{\rm J}$ is within the specified temperature limits. In applications with high power dissipation and poor thermal resistance, the maximum ambient temperature may have to be derated.

In applications with moderate power dissipation and low PCB thermal resistance, the maximum ambient temperature can exceed the maximum limit as long as the junction temperature is within specification limits. The junction temperature (T_J) of the device is dependent on the ambient temperature (T_A), the power dissipation of the device (P_D), and the junction-to-ambient thermal resistance of the package (θ_{IA}).

The maximum junction temperature (T_J) is calculated from the ambient temperature (T_A) and power dissipation (P_D) using the formula

$$T_I = T_A + (P_D \times \theta_{IA})$$

The junction-to-ambient thermal resistance (θ_{JA}) of the package is based on modeling and calculation using a 4-layer board. The junction-to-ambient thermal resistance is highly dependent on the application and board layout. In applications where high maximum power dissipation exists, close attention to thermal

board design is required. The value of θ_{JA} may vary, depending on PCB material, layout, and environmental conditions. The specified values of θ_{JA} are based on a 4-layer, 4 in. \times 3 in. circuit board. See JESD51-7 for detailed information on the board construction.

 Ψ_{JB} is the junction-to-board thermal characterization parameter with units of °C/W. Ψ_{JB} of the package is based on modeling and calculation using a 4-layer board. The JESD51-12, *Guidelines for Reporting and Using Electronic Package Thermal Information*, states that thermal characterization parameters are not the same as thermal resistances. Ψ_{JB} measures the component power flowing through multiple thermal paths rather than a single path as in thermal resistance, θ_{JB} . Therefore, Ψ_{JB} thermal paths include convection from the top of the package as well as radiation from the package, factors that make Ψ_{JB} more useful in real-world applications. Maximum junction temperature (T_J) is calculated from the board temperature (T_B) and power dissipation (P_D) using the formula

$$T_I = T_R + (P_D \times \Psi_{IR})$$

See JESD51-8 and JESD51-12 for more detailed information about $\Psi_{\mbox{\tiny IR}}.$




Figure 2. 5-Lead TSOT Pin Configuration




Figure 3. Output Voltage vs. Junction Temperature




Figure 4. Output Voltage vs. Load Current




Figure 5. Output Voltage vs. Input Voltage




Figure 6. Ground Current vs. Junction Temperature




Figure 7. Ground Current vs. Load Current




Figure 8. Ground Current vs. Input Voltage




Figure 9. Shutdown Current vs. Temperature at Various Input Voltages




Figure 10. Dropout Voltage vs. Load Current




Figure 11. Output Voltage vs. Input Voltage (in Dropout)




Figure 12. Ground Current vs. Input Voltage (in Dropout)




Figure 13. Power Supply Rejection Ratio vs. Frequency, $V_{OUT} = 1.2 \text{ V}$, $V_{IN} = 2.2 \text{ V}$




Figure 14. Power Supply Rejection Ratio vs. Frequency, $V_{OUT} = 2.8 \text{ V}$, $V_{IN} = 3.3 \text{ V}$




Figure 15. Power Supply Rejection Ratio vs. Frequency, $V_{OUT} = 3.3 \text{ V}$, $V_{IN} = 3.8 \text{ V}$




Figure 16. Power Supply Rejection Ratio vs. Frequency at Various Output Voltages and Load Currents, $V_{OUT} - V_{IN} = 0.5 V$, except for $V_{OUT} = 1.1 V$, $V_{IN} = 2.2 V$




Figure 17. Power Supply Rejection Ratio vs. Frequency at Various Voltages and Load Currents, V_{OUT} = 2.8 V




Figure 18. Output Noise vs. Load Current and Output Voltage, $V_{IN} = 5 \text{ V}, C_{OUT} = 1 \mu\text{F}$




Figure 19. Output Noise Spectral Density vs. Frequency, $V_{IN} = 5 \text{ V}$, $I_{LOAD} = 10 \text{ mA}$, $C_{OUT} = 1 \mu\text{F}$




Figure 20. Load Transient Response, C_{IN} , $C_{OUT} = 1 \mu F$, $I_{LOAD} = 1 mA$ to 200 mA




Figure 21. Line Transient Response, C_{IN} , $C_{OUT} = 1 \mu F$, $I_{LOAD} = 200 \text{ mA}$




Figure 22. Line Transient Response, C_{IN} , $C_{\text{OUT}} = 1 \, \mu\text{F}$, $I_{\text{LOAD}} = 1 \, \text{mA}$

APPLICATIONS INFORMATION

THERMAL CONSIDERATIONS

In most applications, the ADP151-EP does not dissipate much heat due to its high efficiency. However, in applications with a high ambient temperature and a high supply voltage to output voltage differential, the heat dissipated in the package can cause the junction temperature of the die to exceed the maximum junction temperature of 125°C.

When the junction temperature exceeds 150°C, the converter enters thermal shutdown. It recovers only after the junction temperature has decreased below 135°C to prevent any permanent damage. Therefore, thermal analysis for the chosen application is very important to guarantee reliable performance over all conditions. The junction temperature of the die is the sum of the ambient temperature of the environment and the temperature rise of the package due to the power dissipation, as shown in Equation 1.

To guarantee reliable operation, the junction temperature of the ADP151-EP must not exceed 125°C. To ensure that the junction temperature stays below this maximum value, the user must be aware of the parameters that contribute to junction temperature changes. These parameters include ambient temperature, power dissipation in the power device, and thermal resistances between the junction and ambient air (θ_{JA}) . The θ_{JA} number is dependent on the package assembly compounds that are used and the amount of copper used to solder the package GND pins to the PCB.

Table 6 shows typical θ_{JA} values of the 5-lead TSOT for various PCB copper sizes. Table 7 shows the typical Ψ_{JB} values of the 5-lead TSOT.

The junction temperature of the ADP151-EP can be calculated from the following equation:

$$T_I = T_A + (P_D \times \theta_{IA}) \tag{1}$$

where:

 T_A is the ambient temperature.

 P_D is the power dissipation in the die, given by

$$P_{D} = [(V_{IN} - V_{OUT}) \times I_{LOAD}] + (V_{IN} \times I_{GND})$$

where:

 I_{IOAD} is the load current.

 I_{GND} is the ground current.

 V_{IN} and V_{OUT} are input and output voltages, respectively.

Power dissipation due to ground current is quite small and can be ignored. Therefore, the junction temperature equation simplifies to the following:

$$T_{I} = T_{A} + \{ [(V_{IN} - V_{OUT}) \times I_{IOAD}] \times \theta_{IA} \}$$




Figure 23. TSOT 500 mm² of PCB Copper, $T_{\Delta} = 25^{\circ}\text{C}$

As shown in Equation 3, for a given ambient temperature, input-to-output voltage differential and continuous load current, there exists a minimum copper size requirement for the PCB to ensure that the junction temperature does not rise above 125°C. Figure 23 through Figure 28 shows junction temperature calculations for various ambient temperatures, load currents, $V_{\rm IN}$ -to- $V_{\rm OUT}$ differentials, and areas of PCB copper.




Figure 24. TSOT 100 mm² of PCB Copper, $T_A = 25$ °C




Figure 25. TSOT 50 mm² of PCB Copper, $T_A = 25$ °C




Figure 26. TSOT 500 mm² of PCB Copper, $T_A = 50^{\circ}$ C




Figure 27. TSOT 100 mm² of PCB Copper, $T_A = 50$ °C




Figure 28. TSOT 50 mm² of PCB Copper, $T_A = 50^{\circ}$ C




Figure 29. TSOT, $T_A = 85$ °C

In the case where the board temperature is known, use the thermal characterization parameter, Ψ_{JB} , to estimate the junction temperature rise (see Figure 29). Maximum junction temperature (T_J) is calculated from the board temperature (T_B) and power dissipation (P_D) using the following formula:

$$T_I = T_B + (P_D \times \Psi_{IB}) \tag{4}$$

The typical value of $\Psi_{\rm IB}$ is 43°C/W for the 5-lead TSOT package.

PRINTED CIRCUIT BOARD LAYOUT CONSIDERATIONS

Heat dissipation from the package can be improved by increasing the amount of copper attached to the pins of the ADP151-EP. However, as listed in Table 6, a point of diminishing returns is eventually reached, beyond which an increase in the copper size does not yield significant heat dissipation benefits.

Place the input capacitor as close as possible to the VIN and GND pins. Place the output capacitor as close as possible to the VOUT and GND pins. Use of 0402 or 0603 size capacitors and resistors achieves the smallest possible footprint solution on boards where area is limited.




Figure 30. Example TSOT PCB Layout




Figure 31. 5-Lead Thin Small Outline Transistor Package [TSOT] (UJ-5)
